The month of February was another record month for snow fall. Even though our monthly run totals are up from February of last year, we are down from January. One of the reasons may be because of the fact that there are fewer days in the month.

Chief George and I spent several days at the statehouse appearing for bills that were presented. First was the dispatch funding bill that passed the House but was defeated in Senate committee. It is not dead yet, but it looks like it may not get picked up and included in another bill that was moving forward. We are hopeful that we can work on the wording and take into account some of the suggestions that Senators made and perhaps bring the idea up again next year. The 911 fee structure will also be up for evaluation next year and this may provide us either an opening to re-introduce legislation, or perhaps see additional funding come forward if the fee structure for 911 is increased. Chief George also represented us last week at a yearly state fire chief's legislative breakfast where we invite legislatures to meet and discuss legislation that affects fire

service organizations throughout the state. Chief George stated that the breakfast was well attended by legislatures. Chief George also attended legislation hearing to represent the state fire chiefs in voicing disapproval of consolidation legislation for the City of Indianapolis. The state fire chiefs organization voted as a body to register our hope that the legislation would be defeated because the state fire chiefs were not in favor of any forced consolidations.

Last month, Karen Hendershot and I attended a grant writing seminar downtown at the state offices. The program presented different state grants that we might be eligible for in addition to teaching participants how to use and navigate the state iGMS grant website. We are currently working through a haz mat grant that is utilizing this site, so it gave me a better working knowledge of the workings. In addition, it began to give Karen some education about how to write grants proposals. Last week, I wrote two training grants

through Hendricks Regional Health and the Hendricks Community Foundation. I have already received feedback from HRH saying that they were in support of the grant that I submitted and wanted to fund the project fully. They advised that they would contact me as soon as they had approval for the funds. This grant will help to provide situational awareness training to all career and volunteer firefighters in the county. It will be provided on a Thursday, Friday and Saturday, two time a day so that full time crews and funnel through and volunteer personnel can also take part.

Last month, the director of Project Lifesaver (PLS) Hendricks County resigned his position with the organization. If you all recall, this program is overseen by the county fire chief's organization and services approximately 40 clients throughout the county. It provides transmitters for clients who tend to wander or who might get lost. It also provides receiver for local responders who can come to the aid of these individuals and assist in finding them. It has become apparent to the county chiefs, that this program is becoming to involved for a volunteer person, and needed the attention of a person who can commit some full time work to it. After taking with Karen and the trustee, I provided an option to the county chiefs that I would be willing to have Karen take over the program. Our department has committed to giving Karen a day or two a month to administer the program. This would include supervision training for responders, battery changes for clients and supply allocation to responding organization. She would also be involved in fund raising as part of her work with the program. During her time working on PLS, she will be on department time, but will be utilizing a PLS vehicle and supplies and all expenses will be covered by the program. We will continually evaluate her time commitment to ensure that it does not keep her from completing her other obligations. Karen has FF Bill Webb who will assist her with the program on his days on shift and he has agreed to serve as her backup when she is not available. If you recall, Bill is a part director of the program and has a great deal of knowledge about the program.

Last month, Karen also attended a juvenile fire setters program in Bloomington. Karen also began our community fitness outreach initiative and is not holding fitness classes on Saturdays, and Karen also held her first fitness class at the pavilion last evening.

Beginning this month, I would like to begin sharing great things that our crews do on a daily basis. My hope is to provide you with one outstanding act that was performed by crews. I only regret that I have not done a better job of sharing this type of recognition. So here is the first installment.

"On Jan. 7th a vehicle had went off into a ditch in front of station 142. The day before we had a large amount of snow fall so road conditions were not great. Station 142 crew

members went out to check on the couple in the vehicle. The couple stated they were okay but the car was so buried in snow they were unable to get it out. While the couple called AAA we invited them into the firehouse to stay warm. The couple stayed the firehouse for nearly 4 1/2 hours. AAA could not give a time of arrival to pull vehicle out. At that time Lt. Joseph stated he had a tow strap in his truck and offered to tow the couple out. The couple than obliged and were very grateful. The following week the couple sent a card to thank the crew for their hospitality. They also sent two homemade pies and \$50 for the crew to by pizza."


