



Parks Department Board Report

September 10, 2014 (reporting on August)

Administrative Update

- We received the Quality of Work Life Survey results back from HPG which detail worker satisfaction working for Washington Township in the various Departments. The result were provided on a whole and were also distributed (by request) based on individual Department results. These results will be discussed and analyzed during Workshop #2 to be conducted on September 25th.
- We have received estimates for our 2015 Capital Improvement Plan and have begun reviewing them and discussing timelines for completion of said projects.
- The Park newsletter (in your packet of information for your reading pleasure) went out on September 2nd. This newsletter covers upcoming Park events for the months of September – December and reviews highlights from the previous three months as well. The newsletter will be available to subscribe to (form to fill out on our website) and it will be posted on the website, the Facebook page, available for pick up on our program brochure desk at the office, mailed out to those who subscribe to receive it via mail, sent home with each child in the Avon Community School Corp and other avenues which we are continuing to explore.
- I attended the Central District Indiana Parks & Recreation Association meeting late August which was held in Richmond Indiana. Discussed during the meeting was the Indiana Bicentennial initiative which the State is promoting and some of the projects which are being completed with the assistance of the financial monies available by seeking grant funding. Funding is primarily available for land acquisition but I am exploring other available funds and/or resources. One possible avenue is discovering that we could advertise Park events during 2015 through the bicentennial project which would be an exposure that is completely different from we have done in the past. I also continued to meet with individuals at the meeting who would be good speakers and/or participants for the Accessible Trails Workshop that I will be conducting in October at the Park. I approached a colleague of mine who is the contact for both Indiana and Ohio for the National Park Service Rivers, Trails and Conservation Assistance Program. He would be a great individual to have participate in the training and we discussed a few different options at the meeting.
- Stephani Massa attended a workshop sponsored by Sports Indiana (we were offered a free registration) on Post Event Evaluation and Follow-up. As a result of the workshop, we will be working towards completing post-event wrap-ups in-house for Park sponsored programs and will also be evaluating our existing Pavilion Center rental survey to determine in what ways it can be improved. We will also be looking to provide those individuals who rented the picnic shelters the opportunity to provide feedback about their experience because we know that is one area that needs improving.

- Met with VFIS and did a walk-thru of our Park – they are the risk assessment branch of our Property & Casualty Insurance provider. The main items identified during the process will be outlined for us in a report for us to begin to resolve. We are already working towards addressing those items pointed out during our walk-thru in an attempt to be proactive. The main items identified were no barriers to prevent vehicles from backing into our raised diesel tank, no release of liability and hold harmless language in our shelter rental agreements (we can use the same language we have for the Paw Park agreements), no prior engineering assessment of the Whipple Iron Truss bridge to determine its structural strength and safety for public use, and to conduct playground assessments more frequently when during the busy months. He applauded us for our contracts for the Pavilion Center (in particular where it deals with alcohol) and the fact that there were very few items he found during his time with us. I have a contact who would be very good to have out to conduct an engineering assessment of the bridge and will begin looking into the cost of the assessment and finding room in the budget for it.
- Completed an update of RecPro which is our primary recreation scheduling software – during that time I spoke with the President of the company and asked what the feasibility would be to start fresh at some point with a new database. I had expressed my frustrations with the functionality of the program, but during the update we were shown how it should be functioning but can't due to previous Park Administration not setting it up properly. They told us that they would be willing to provide us with a brand new, empty database so that we can start fresh, provide up to 10 hours of training on the product, and include set-up for the new database all free of charge. We will be able to use the old database to set a pre-determined point in time that we will continue to take reservations in it for, and then will eventually transition to the new database.

Events

- The third Concert for the Summer Concert Series in the Park occurred this month – attendance was lower than expected, especially with a relatively big name for the area. We've talked with Avon Town Hall Park to see if we can't combine our resources and have our Park provide the venue for the bands, but split the costs in terms of advertising and paying for the bands. We advertised in virtually every free avenue for this event. We would like to determine if this type of event is still (it was identified in previous master plan as a desired activity) an activity the community would like to have and if so, if it needs to maybe be moved to a weekend event. This will need to be pre-planned as we do not book large park events during times that the Pavilion Center is booked for weddings on the weekends.
- Continue to host Insanity classes at the Pavilion Center Tuesday nights at 6pm and PiYo classes following the Insanity class beginning at 6:45pm. There is also PiYo in the Park on Thursday evenings which has continued to have a turn-out and draws attention from those visiting the Park for other recreation purposes.
- We hosted both Avon Middle School North and South Cross Country meets and practices during the month of August. We are happy to be able to provide a venue for an event in the community which continues to connect us to Avon Community Schools. We look forward to being able to host them during the month of September as well.
- We will be working with two Eagle Scouts this year to complete two separate projects. One will be working to rebuild a foot bridge which was washed down river in the flood last year. The

other will be building three new benches for our Paw Park. This one has a special connection with a member of the community who had contacted me seeking a memorial plaque in the Paw Park. I put the scout in touch with this individual to discuss options for her helping with funding in exchange for a memorial plaque on one of the benches which he will build. It seems to be a great fit – both parties feel as if the contribution is greater than just a bench or a plaque and we hope to do more like this in the future. We have refined our Eagle Scout request procedure and are in touch with parents and scout leaders each time we get a request for a project.

Maintenance Update

- Please see attached document detailing the breakdown of labor hours for the month of June.
- All monthly and seasonal checklists implemented at the Park have been completed and we are addressing the needs identified on the checklists.
- We hired a new part-time maintenance individual who will be working for us 24 hours per week including being involved in the weekend rotation. His name is Greg Kennedy and I would like to welcome him aboard!
- Maintenance worked to organize receiving bids for tree removal in both the Park and the Cemeteries. We have received those bids and they are setting up timeframes for work to be completed in the Park. The Township Trustee will need to work with the Township Administrator to determine the best method of completing the removal of the necessary trees at the cemeteries. We will be closing the upper part of the park (will be doing it during the day on a weekday) with advanced notice to the public during the time that we will be taking the trees down. This is preventative in terms of safety as most of the trees surround the playground and shelter. There are a total of 6 trees which have been marked for removal.

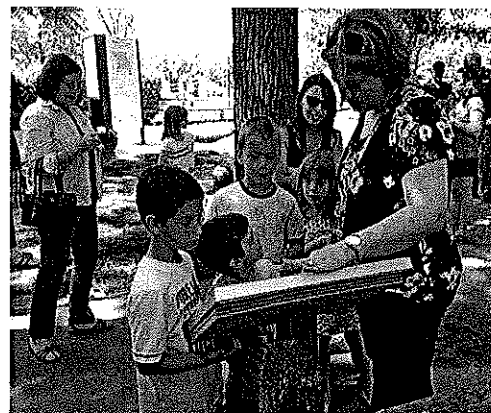
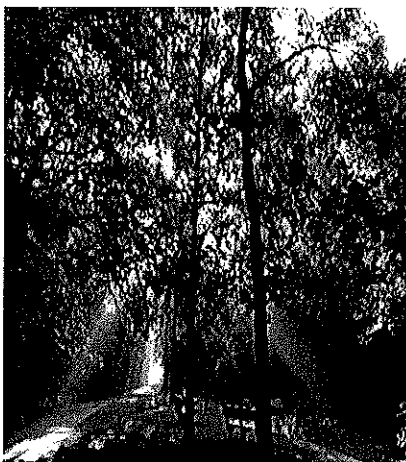

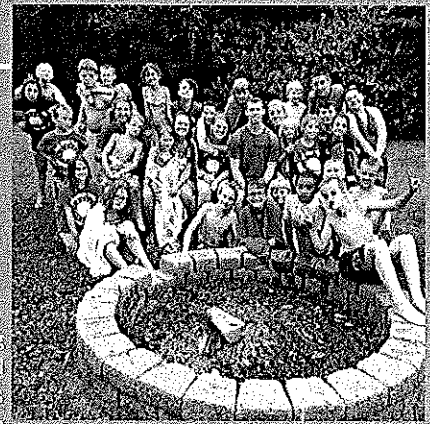


Area Cross Country Teams
